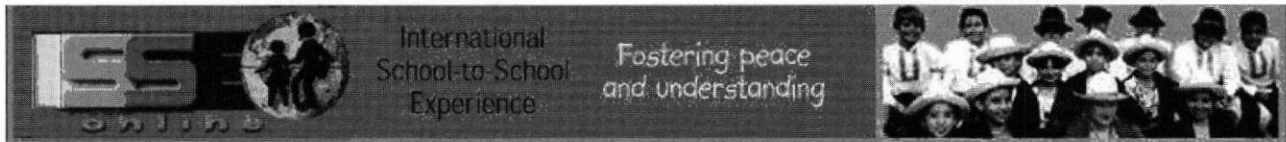

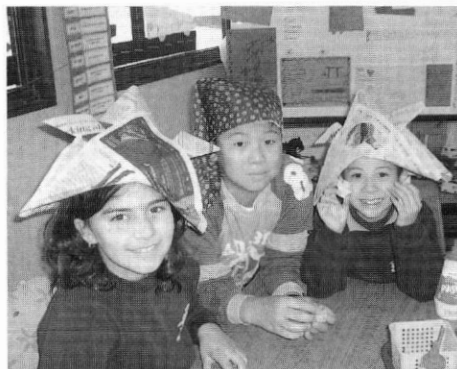
the foreign students and it was the best experience for me to realize that both Japanese and foreign people were equally nice and kind to other people.

Activities report of TSIE

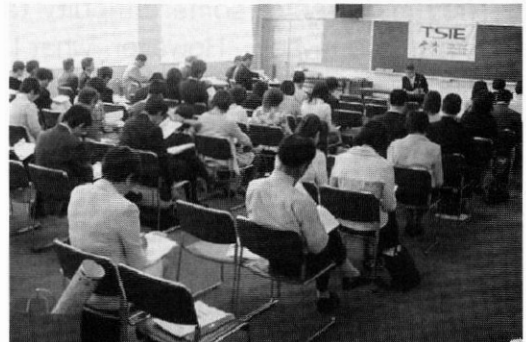
Norie Sawada (Chairman of ISSE Japan)
